**BRIEF OF DEFENDANT BERKS COUNTY BOARD OF ELECTIONS IN  
OPPOSITION TO PLAINTIFFS’ MOTION FOR SUMMARY JUDGMENT ON  
COUNTS II AND III OF PLAINTIFFS’ SECOND AMENDED COMPLAINT**

Defendant Berks County Board of Elections (“Berks County”) opposes Plaintiffs’ motion for summary judgment (doc. 400) as to Plaintiffs’ remaining constitutional claims asserted in Counts II and III of Plaintiffs’ Second Amended Complaint (doc 413). As explained in Berks County’s July 5, 2024 motion for summary judgment and supporting brief (doc. 437, 438),<sup>1</sup> Plaintiffs’ claims against Berks County in Count II (Equal Protection claim) and Count III (First and Fourteenth Amendment Right-to-Vote Claim) should be dismissed because Plaintiffs lack standing to assert either of these claims against Berks County. Moreover, enforcing the Pennsylvania Election Code’s statutory requirement that voters not only sign but also write the

correct date on the voter declaration on the outer envelope used to submit their absentee and mail-in ballots (the “Date Requirement”) does not violate either the Equal Protection Clause or the right to vote guaranteed by the First and Fourteenth Amendments to the United States Constitution.
